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Course Goals and Methods

Students will have a firm grasp of some major topics in analytical philosophy as well as the reasoning, reading, and writing skills central to philosophical thinking of any sort.

Class Text

The required text for this class is Readings in Ultimate Questions and the companion text by Nils Ch. Rauhut. The Philosopher's Toolkit is also recommended.

Evaluation

25% (x3) 4-6 page papers arguing for or against an article or topic from class

5% (x4) 1-page argument reconstruction

10% Class participation

Term Papers

A philosophy paper makes an argument in favor or against a position (i.e. a reading) by clearly stating the premises and attacking one. Discussion on this to follow. Sample topics will be handed out in class, though you are encouraged to submit your own provided you run it by me first.

Argument Reconstruction

At any point throughout the semester, you should read the assigned article, summerize, and reconstruct it in one page. These must be turned in before the class discussion.

Class Participation

Contribution to the class discussion is actively encouraged. To get the full ten percent for this, you should comment early and often. Honest commenting is rewarded (i.e. no false confusion, but don't fear asking basic questions).
